Meeting a Piece of Music for the First Time

- 1. Be mindful of your manners, trying not to be guilty of musically inappropriate forwardness.
- 2. Have some idea where the backbeat should go.
- 3. Get out of your own determined mind-set and have an awareness of the musical context.
- 4. Start out simple, with your ears wide open so that you are not filling up the musical space with your own ambitions.
- 5. That way you can hear what the bassist and rhythm guitar player are doing. Then you can get a little more clever or intimate.
- 6. Respect what the rest of the rhythm section is doing.
- 7. If they aren't doing anything continuous and steady, the drums need to provide that.
- 8. A good drumbeat should be as solid as a mountain, while at the same time having the quality of sunlight or fresh air coming through it.
- 9. When in doubt, play simply and not too busy. And always listen to the bass player, whose pattern will guide your fee and hands as to what to play.
